Trump denies any wrongdoing



Secret-documents indictment

Wilful retention of national defence papers, corruptly concealing documents, conspiracy to obstruct justice, and making false statements.

Georgia criminal investigation

Inquiry into Jan 2, 2021, phone call Trump made to fellow Republican Georgia Secretary of State **Brad Raffensperger** asking him to "find" enough votes to beat **Joe Biden**, saying, "*I just want to find 11,780 votes.*"

Sexual abuse and defamation

Trump may face second defamation trial brought by **E. Jean Carroll** (right) – magazine writer who won \$5 million in damages from Trump for sexual battery and defamation.

Carroll seeks further \$10 million after Trump made public comments blasting verdict



Mary Trump lawsuit

Former president's niece, **Mary Trump**, sued her uncle, his sister **Maryanne**, and estate of their late brother **Robert** for allegedly cheating her out of her share of family fortune. Trump won dismissal of lawsuit; Mary Trump is seeking to have it reinstated



Bid to overturn election result

Justice Department inquiry into whether Trump or people tied to him instigated deadly attack on U.S. Capitol on Jan 6, 2021, in bid to stop **Joe Biden's** certification as president.

A New York grand jury indicted Trump on 34 counts of allegedly falsifying business records and exceeding federal campaign contribution limits in connection with \$130,000 hush payment made to porn star **Stormy Daniels** (left), before 2016 presidential election.

Trump fraud case

Civil lawsuit seeks to permanently bar Trump and three of his adult children from running companies in New York state and to recoup \$250 million obtained through fraud.

Oct 2023: Trial to start
