April 1, 1999

▲ A new territory, Nunavut, “our land”, was created in Canada to provide autonomy for the Inuit people. It comprises most of the Canadian Arctic archipelago

1999: Oil companies BP and Amoco merged to form a giant conglomerate worth nearly \$100 billion

2004: The high-speed Korea Train Express (KTX) averaging speeds of 300km per hour, entered service

2014: Prime Minister Shinzo Abe lifted Japan's self-imposed ban on weapons exports, in place since 1967

2023: A German artist rejected a top photography award, revealing he had used Artificial Intelligence (AI)
