

▲ The Thames Barrier, built to protect London from flooding, was opened. When raised into position its 10 steel gates stand as high as a five-storey building

▲ Unrest erupted in Pakistan after former Prime Minister Imran Khan was arrested on alleged corruption charges in a court appearance in Islamabad


1901: Australia opened its first federal parliament in Melbourne. It moved to the new capital, Canberra, in 1927

2004: Kremlin-backed Chechen President Akhmad Kadyrov was assassinated by a bomb in Grozny

2004: Construction began in Istanbul on a \$4.5bn rail tunnel under the Bosphorus. It finally opened in 2013

2014: Syrian government forces captured the city of Homs after a three-year siege

May 10, 1994

Nelson Mandela was sworn in as South Africa's first black president. Jailed for 27 years as a militant anti-apartheid activist, he was freed in 1990

1924: J. Edgar Hoover became the first Director of the FBI

1954: The silicon-based junction transistor went into commercial production

1962: Marvel Comics published the first issue of The Incredible Hulk, a greenskinned, heavily muscled humanoid

1994: Media tycoon Silvio Berlusconi became prime minister of Italy. He remained a major player in Italian politics for almost 20 years

▲ Surrealist painter Salvador Dali was born in Spain. Works such as The Persistence of Memory are renowned for their striking and often bizarre images

868: The earliest complete example of a dated printed book, the Diamond Sutra, ("sutra" meaning "teaching") was published in China

1949: Siam changed its name to Thailand for the second time

1994: Deir al-Balah became the first town in Gaza to come under Palestinian self-rule

2014: The eastern Ukrainian provinces of Donetsk and Luhansk voted overwhelmingly for self-rule
