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August 29, 1896

▲ The Chinese-American dish chop suey – meat and eggs cooked quickly with vegetables in a starch-thickened sauce – was invented in New York City

1966: The Beatles played their last live concert at Candlestick Park, California, to a 25,000-strong crowd

▲ The first British children were evacuated from London as war with Germany loomed closer. The plan was to protect them from the risk of aerial bombing of the city

▲ Troops of the former Soviet Union took part in a farewell ceremony in Berlin, ending half a century of military presence on German soil

1944: Russian troops captured the Romanian capital, Bucharest

1994: The IRA declared an unconditional end to its 25-year war against British rule in Northern Ireland

1994: China voted to disband Hong Kong's elected institutions on resuming sovereignty in 1997

1999: French farmers picketed McDonald's restaurants in protest at heavy U.S. taxes on French products

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
