

End of low-cost tariff exemption in U.S.

The end of the “de minimis” tariff exemption for low-cost goods under a value of \$800 raises online prices for U.S. consumers and leads many countries to suspend postal services to the U.S.

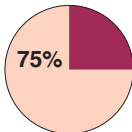

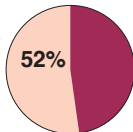
