The ongoing hunt for Bin Laden

The U.S. has hunted Osama bin Laden using satellite tracking systems and sophisticated spying systems, but the al-Qaeda leader remains at large. He is widely believed to be hiding in the remote tribal region along the Pakistan-Afghanistan border with his deputy, Ayman al-Zawahri

- Sep 2001: After 9/11 terror attacks, President George W. Bush signs top-secret Memorandum of Notification calling for Bin Laden to be captured or killed on sight
- Oct: U.S.-led coalition begins military strikes against Afghanistan
- Dec: Radio messages by Bin Laden intercepted from his Tora Bora hase
- Jan 2002: Bin Laden thought to have escaped to Waziristan after battle of Tora Bora
- Jan 2003: U.S. special forces sent to Afghanistan to capture Bin Laden
- Feb: Spy satellites trace phone call by Bin Laden's son to Baluchistan. U.S. Task Force 121 and Pakistani officials intercept suspicious convoy - Bin Laden not found
- Mar: Task Force 121 and Pakistani



authorities storm villa in Rawalpindi and capture Khalid Sheikh Mohammed thought to be third in command in al-Qaeda

Mav-Jul 2004: Pakistan President General Pervez Musharraf mounts offensive in Waziristan in failed attempt to capture Bin Laden



- Oct: Bin Laden videotape, aired days before U.S. presidential election, threatens fresh attacks on U.S.
- Mar 2005: Bush makes rare mention. of Bin Laden, saying U.S. is "working day and night" to bring him to justice



18 people in village of Damadola killed

Jan 24: Pakistan premier Shaukat Aziz due to meet Bush in U.S. amid relations strained by bombing raid
